SHELLEY, Mary Wollstonecraft 1797-1851

- 1832 Mary Shelley - author of "Frankenstein" took up lodgings ^{in Sandgate} to avoid the cholera epidemic menacing London. Trelawney, an old friend of her late husband who was at Leghorn when he died in a storm, asks her to care for his daughter, teach her housekeeping and engage her mind.
- 1840 - Mary Shelley was here again staying in row of small cottages now demolished.
