'A Good Reputation Endures Forever'
A History of the Chinese Labour Corps in World War I
31st January – 17th March, 2018

The story of the Chinese Labour Corps, or CLC, has until recently been greatly overlooked in the context of WWI history. Folkestone Museum in partnership with Durham University Oriental Museum and The Meridian Society present an exhibition revealing the immense contribution these men made to the war effort: building roads and docks; assembling equipment; digging trenches; and clearing mines.

After war broke out in France and Belgium, the Allies found themselves having to replenish their troops with men from munitions factories and strategic ports. To replace them, the British came up with the idea of enlisting labourers from China, known to be resilient, hardworking and in need of money. China was at the point of being carved up between various empires and was determined to gain a place for itself at the diplomatic table and regain control of its territories. 140,000 men were recruited, approximately 96,000 by the British alone. After intense military training in China they made the gruelling journey over sea and land, mainly via Canada and the U.K. Exposed to new diseases, understandably not all of the men survived and six of the CLC now have their final resting places at Shorncliffe Cemetery.

This exhibition will bring together artefacts and documentary photographs from the W.J. Hawkings Collection, courtesy of his grandson John de Lucy, to explore the history of the CLC and reveal more about the men buried at Shorncliffe Cemetery. In addition to the material from Durham University, some of the artefacts for the Folkestone exhibition have been donated by direct descendants of the CLC and their commanding officers and have never been on show before, including a rare CLC service medal and an original CLC ID booklet from a recruit who died on route through Canada.

As part of their project on the CLC funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, the Meridian Society, in partnership with Folkestone Museum, will offer a series of adult and family friendly workshops, together with a screening of their film of oral histories: *Forgotten Faces of the First World War*. We also hope to provide an exciting insight into the activities the CLC would have indulged in at Chinese New Year on February 17th. Please check our website and social media for updates on associated events.

The exhibition will travel to Plymouth and Liverpool where the other CLC members who died on British soil are buried. Dates of exhibitions are to be confirmed. Please check the relevant institution's website for further details.

AN EXHIBITION featuring posters, photographs and letters from Folkestone during the First World War was officially opened last week.

Presented by the Folkestone & District Local History Society with Step Short and Folkestone Camera Club, the memorabilia has been provided by members of the groups.

Also among the collection is a red tunic belonging to a First World War British soldier, a German helmet and weapons.

MP Damian Collins was at the opening of the show, at the Saseon Room in Folkestone Library, on Monday July 7.

Hitler misses his chance to invade

THE British Army had abandoned much of its modern equipment in France. The 1st London Division, responsible for the defence of the coast from Sheppey to Rye had no anti-tank guns, no Bren guns, only eleven 25-pounder field guns, four 18 pounders and eight 4.5 inch howitzers from the Great War. Morale was low and Hitler, so everyone thought, was now certain to invade.

Kent began to strengthen its fortress. No visitors were allowed on seafronts. Gun emplacements and pill-boxes, disguised as chalets and tea-stalls began to spring up. Scaffolding and concrete blocks covered beaches and piers were cut off from the shore. Barbed wire was everywhere; in fact the longest train to go through Ashford was a train carrying barbed wire.

Convinced that the German paratroopers and troop gliders would be the first wave of invaders, efforts were being made to make landing difficult. Open spaces, the Downs, golf courses, straight roads were strewn with obstacles, including old cars, buses, carts and even iron bedsteads.

Hitler would have had a good chance of success in those days immediately after Dunkirk but, still hoping that there

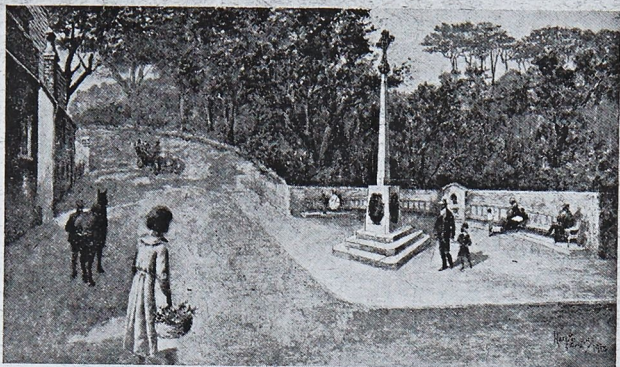
could be peace with Britain, so that he could be free to launch an assault on Russia, he was not ready to strike — but he did want control of the English Channel.

On June 17th, the White Star liner, *Lancastria*, converted into a troopship, was attacked by five German aircraft in her berth in St Nazaire. More than half of the 5,000 on board died. It was the forerunner to a month of attacks on British convoys in the Channel.

On the same day, Churchill gave another inspirational performance in the House of Commons: "Let us brace ourselves to our duty and so bear ourselves that if the British Commonwealth and Empire lasts for a thousand years, men will still say: This was their finest hour".

A month later, on July 16th, Hitler retaliated by issuing a new War Directive: "As England, in spite of her hopeless military position, has so far shown herself unwilling to come to any compromise, I have decided to begin preparations for and, if necessary, to carry out the invasion of England....if necessary, the island will be occupied. The landing must be a surprise crossing on a broad front from Ramsgate to the Isle of Wight....The invasion is to be codenamed *Sealion*".

SANDGATE WAR MEMORIAL.



The above illustration shows the design of the War Memorial at Sandgate selected by the Committee. As will be seen, it stands at the junction of the High Street with Military-road. The British Red Cross Society, who have recently purchased the Enbrook Estate, have kindly given a strip of land about 30ft. in width, which will not only provide a most appropriate site for the Memorial but will also enable the Sandgate Urban District Council to carry out a widening of the

road there, which will be a material improvement.

The design, which has been prepared by Mr. H. Evans (late Acting Surveyor to the Council), will be carried out in silver grey Cornish granite with two memorial plaques upon the plinth in Kupon-bronze. The total cost is expected to be about £500. This figure does not include any of the expense connected with the widening of the road, which is a matter for the Sandgate Council.

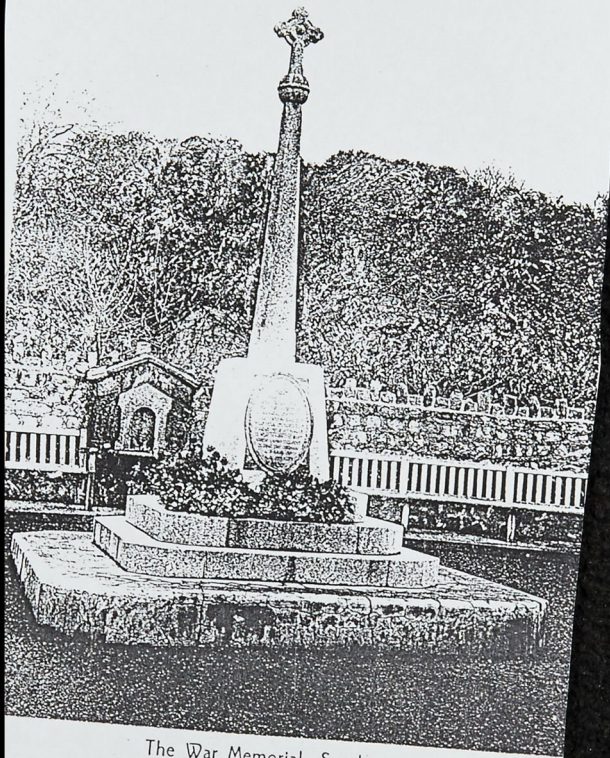
The Committee are issuing an appeal to all the inhabitants of Sandgate for subscriptions to meet the expense. A Sub-Committee consisting of Messrs. W. H. Burden, H. J. Whiting and C. W. Cloke have been requested to under the collection, and subscriptions may be sent to any of these gentlemen, or to Mr. H. Stainer, the Hon. Sec., at the Council Offices, Sandgate.

Prior to 1880 a row of about six small tenements occupied the corner frontage where it is proposed to erect the memorial, they narrowed the entrance to the military road, so that a load of straw to the camp could only just get through, also they projected so far that there was only a two and half foot path. The Earl of Chichester purchased these buildings and had them pulled down, the Local Board of Health was then given the site.

Sandgate's role in wartime revealed

Display tells tales of villagers' courage and sacrifice

YOUNG men from Sandgate who fought in the First World War have been remembered as part of a commemorative display.

The exhibition, arranged by members of the Sandgate Society, includes sketches made by serviceman Larman Luck while he was in the trenches, as well as photographs and recruitment posters.

There is also the Victoria Cross awarded posthumously to Sandgate soldier Cpl William Cotter, who showed "magnificent courage" when, with a leg blown off and both arms injured, he made his way to a crater, where he steadied his men, helped hold off an enemy attack and held his position for 14 hours.

Award

The 33-year-old died from his injuries, but lived long enough to learn he had been successfully recommended for the award.

Sandgate Society member Jill Partridge said: "We are proud of all the young men from the village of Sandgate who took part in the war, many of whom sadly did not return."

"There are photographs on display, along with a couple of bronze war plaques which were sent to families of those lost in the war."

"We also have many copies of the recruitment posters that were a very common sight at the time, also an insight into the role that women played on the home front during the war."

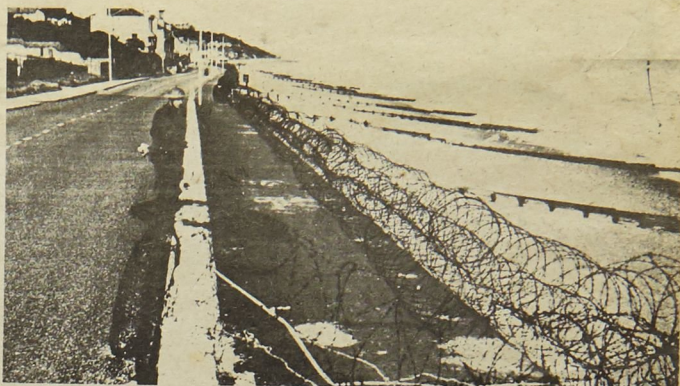

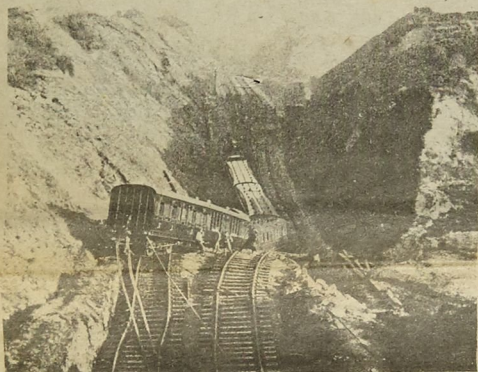




Parachute mines devastated Morehall Avenue in Folkestone on 29 May, 1941, killing 11 people.

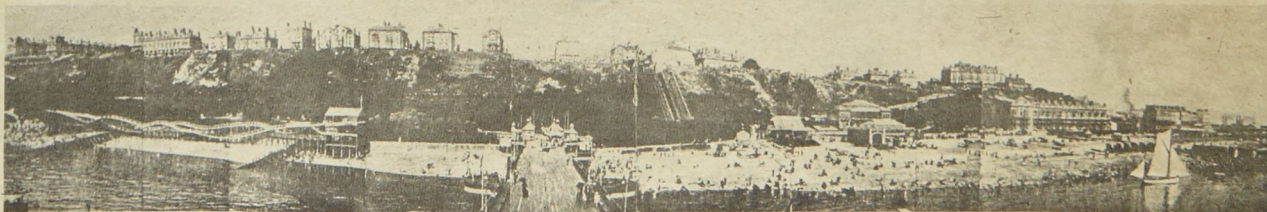

Dear diary,

I was astounded when I entered the trenches and thought that after a day I would loose my mind, and I remembered that this is the only thing to keep me sane. Everyday the sergeant would shout in our ears "Fight your heart out today soldiers!" and Everyday he said it I felt more and more confident. Everyday I think of my future grandchildren and them thinking of me and telling myself stay positive. My favourite day and my proudest is when I earned a medal for killing a certain amount of Germans ! I was so shocked when he announced my name in the enormous hall then he read some other members of the army. The second day of the Trenches was the worst, because I kept hearing the young recruits screaming and my whole body was aching and my arms felt as if they died during it and the screams wore stuck in my head and the sight of people dying and blood everywhere was revolting, as well as that was that I started to feel bad from the sight of death and then my feet felt more painful than before so I informed the nearest commander and he evacuated me from the shooting area.



The Horrors of War

William Richard Cotter VC (March 1882 – 14 March 1916) was an English recipient of the Victoria Cross, the highest and most prestigious award for gallantry in the face of the enemy that can be awarded to British and Commonwealth forces.

Cotter was born in Folkestone, Kent in 1882^[1] the son of Richard and Amy Cotter, his father who had been born in Ireland was described in the 1891 census of Elham as a Plasters Labourer.^[2]

He was 33 years old, and an Acting Corporal in the 6th Battalion, The Buffs (East Kent Regiment), British Army during the First World War when the following deed took place for which he was awarded the VC.

On 6 March 1916 near Hohenzollern Redoubt, France, Corporal Cotter's leg was blown off at the knee and he was also wounded in both arms. He nevertheless made his way unaided for 50 yards to a crater, steadied the men who were holding it, controlled their fire, issued orders and altered their dispositions to meet a fresh counter-attack. For two hours he held his position and only allowed his wounds to be roughly dressed when the attack had quietened down. He could not be moved back for 14 hours and during all this time he had a cheery word for everyone.^[3]

He was buried at Lillers Communal Cemetery, France which is 7 miles north west of Bethune. Plot IV. Row E. Grave 45.^[4]

His Victoria Cross was on display at The Buffs Regimental Museum, Canterbury, England. With the rest of that museum's collections, it has now been transferred to the National Army Museum, where it is not currently on display.

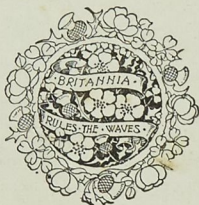

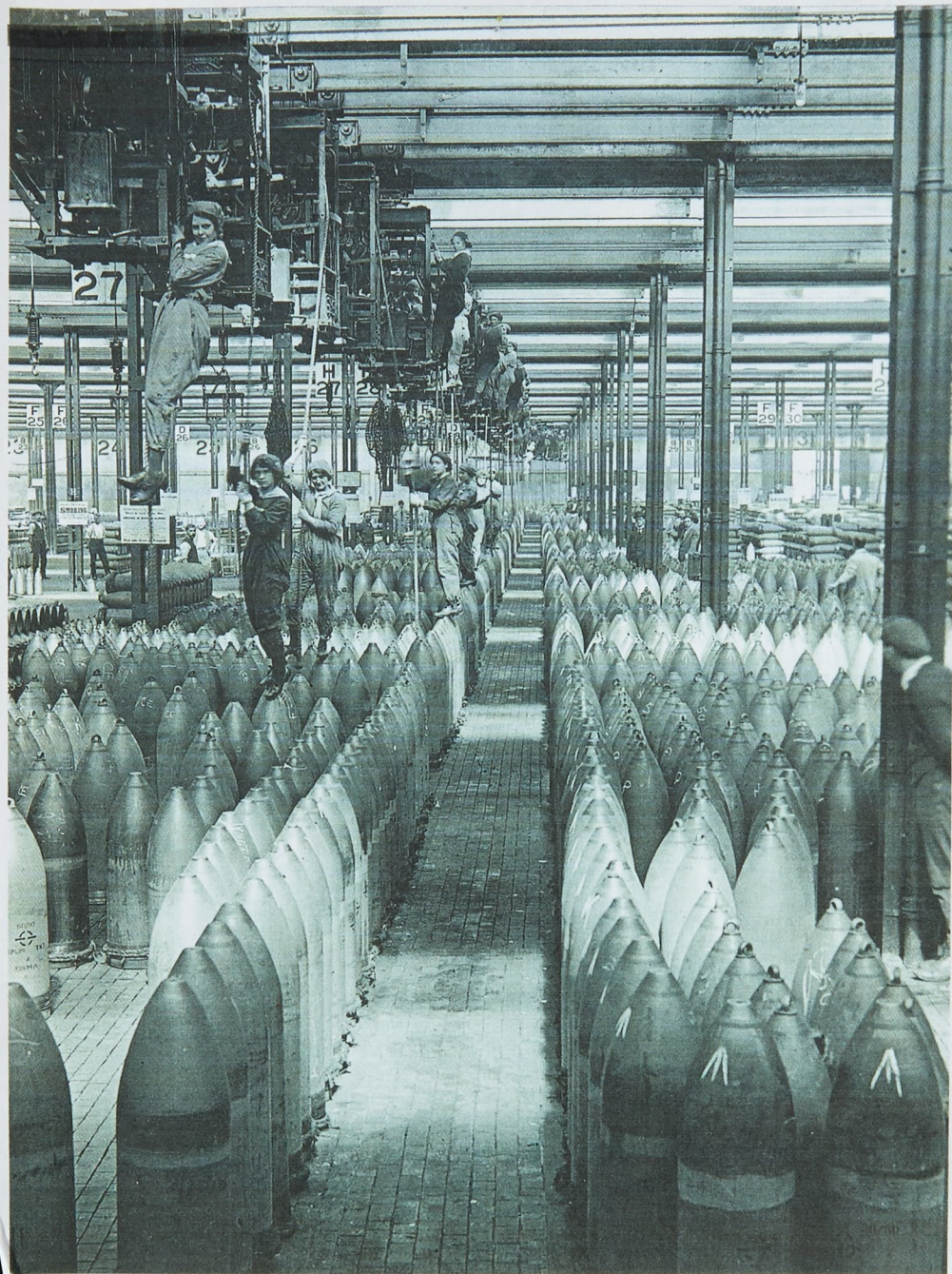

The Sandgate War Memorial has received Grade II Listed Building Status following an application by our vice chairman Guy Valentine-Neale on behalf of the Society's *conservation and planning group**.

The Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport approved the listing of the memorial, which was designed by Harry Evans of Folkestone, and unveiled on 11 May 1921, for the following reasons

* Historic interest: an eloquent witness to the tragic impact of world events on Sandgate community and the sacrifices it had made in the conflicts of the 20th century

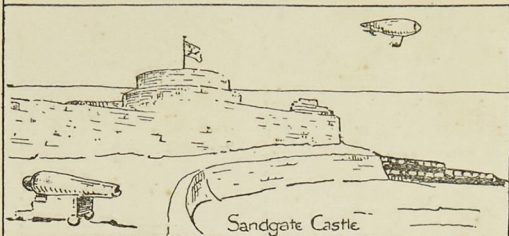
* Architectural interest: an elegant and striking granite memorial cross

* Group value: with the Grade-II listed buildings opposite including the former Fleur de Lis public house and 25, 27 and 29 High Street

**The conservation and planning group, led by Rosemary Saunders, keeps a watching brief on developments in the village and regularly attends the parish council planning committee to act as an advocate in support of our built and landscape heritage. The group is currently leading on a review of this heritage to ensure that all the buildings of national and local interest in the village are recorded and their historical and architectural features are protected.*

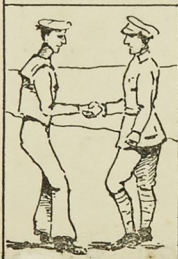
