RULES

1. The Association shall be called the Sandgate Gardeners' Association.
2. The objects shall be generally the promotion of the interests of Allotment and Garden Holders. The Association shall take all action deemed necessary for the future of the movement.

3. Membership shall be open to all persons interested in the Science of Horticulture. Proposals for new membership must be moved and seconded by members and voted upon at a monthly or general meeting. The annual subscription must be paid forthwith.

4. The annual subscription to the Association shall be 3/- to include the yearly schedule. A man and wife will be admitted to membership on payment of an annual subscription of 5/- to include one copy of the yearly schedule.

5. The affairs of the Association shall be managed by the Officers of the Association and a Committee consisting of eight members of the Association, four of whom shall be elected annually for a period of two years. Retiring members shall be eligible for re-election.

6. The officers of the Association shall be elected annually and shall consist of President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Vice-Chairman and the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer.

7. In the event of the resignation, removal or death of a member of the Committee, the vacancy shall be filled at the next monthly meeting. Any member of the Committee failing to attend three consecutive meetings without a satisfactory reason may be replaced.

8. The Association shall meet once a month on the third Thursday at 7.45 p.m. except where otherwise stated in this schedule.

9. The annual general meeting shall be held in February of each year.

10. The Auditor or Auditors shall be appointed by the Committee but members of the Committee shall not act in this capacity.

11. In the competitions announced in this schedule the prize money shall be awarded if there are sufficient entries. Any prize may, at the discretion of the Judges, be withheld or Modified.

12. All exhibits (unless otherwise stated) shall be the bona fide property and/or work of the Exhibitor. No Exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in each class.

13. Rules governing exhibits and staging :

(a) Trays not exceeding 3ft. x 2ft., garnishing, black paper cloth of velvet may be used in showing collections of vegetables. Back boards must not be used except where stated elsewhere.

(e) A vase will be defined as a container not less than 6in. in height, the diameter at the aperture being less than the height.

(f) In classes where flowers are staged in bowls exhibitors will provide their own bowls.

(g) In classes where flowers are staged in baskets the baskets may be with or without handle.

(h) In all Ladies' classes of flowers, etc., arranged for effect the flowers, foliage, etc., may be obtained from any source.

14. Entry fees at monthly meetings will be charged at the rate of 3d. per exhibit.

15. In all classes at monthly meetings the prizes will be : 1st, 2/- ; 2nd, 1/6 ; 3rd, 1/-, except where otherwise stated.

16. At monthly meetings all exhibits shall be staged between 6.45 p.m. and 7.45 p.m.

17. Judging will be carried out in accordance with the rules of the Royal Horticultural Society and N.C.S.

18. Any complaint regarding an exhibit should be reported to the Chairman who shall, with two members of the Committee investigate same and report in full to the Committee.

19. Any questions arising which are not provided for in the Rules shall be determined by the Committee.

20. No alteration shall be made to these Rules except at a general meeting of the Association.

Members are invited to bring any surplus produce to sell for the Society
